- Culture & Arts




Training and Employment

- In last 12 months over 2,140 participants through the 9 programmes we deliver across North Belfast
- Sustained employment for over 357
- 997 through accredited training
- 322 participants were those young people who previously did not participate in any education training or employment programmes



Childcare

- Employ 73 people in sustainable childcare jobs
- Vast majority trained through our programmes
- Largest provider of supported day-care to Health Trust
- Over 240 children per week
- Progression routes for employees
- Acknowledged as best quality








Youth Services
