Community Planning: Northern Ireland Context

Decisions in light of the Review of Public Administration were outlined by ministers on 22 November 2005.

In announcing proposals for the introduction of a duty of community planning to Northern Ireland, Lord Rooker stated that.....

"The aim of community planning is to make sure that people and communities are genuinely engaged in decisions made about public services which affect them.

Through the community planning process we have an opportunity to address poverty, promote good relations, target environmental inequalities and tackle the fundamental issues which prevent the achievement of sustainable communities."

 The drive for community planning should be seen in the context of the process to create more responsive and effective public services for People, across the board.

 Civic leadership is at the very heart of the new council arrangements. Successful local councils must be effective local champions, responding to the aspirations and concerns of their communities and guiding, in partnership with others, the future development of their area.

O Government wants to put community leadership at the heart of every council, and in the hands of every councillor bringing together public agencies and other key stakeholders, including the Voluntary and Community sector and the business sector, to act in partnership to secure excellent services and address local problems.

 The aim of community planning is to make sure that this happens and that people and communities are genuinely engaged in decisions made about the public services which affect them.

 Through the community planning process democratic processes will be strengthened, people will be encouraged to participate in civic life and political life.

DEVELOPING A FRAMEWORK

 A Community Planning Sub Group, chaired by Tom McCall, reported at the end of June 2006, making 21 recommendations, covering areas such as legislation, statutory guidance, pilot projects and capacity building.

 The Department carefully considered the report of the Community Planning Sub-group and developed the requisite robust policy proposals to inform Community Planning legislation.

 Preliminary work has also been commenced in respect of the design of a Community Planning Pilot Programme that will be used to inform the development and operation of community planning and the statutory guidance that will support the introduction of Community Planning.

Review of the Local Government RPA decisions / current position.

 Upon restoration of a devolved Administration the NI Executive decided to undertake a Review of the local government aspects of the PRA.

- Executive Sub-Committee
 established to take Review forward.
- Chaired by Minister of the Environment, Arlene Foster MLA.
- 4 other Ministers members of ESC;
 DSD, DRD, DHSSPS & DFP.

- Review has three inter-linking strands -
- Developing a shared Vision for local government in N.I.;
- Looking at optimum number of councils required;
- Considering functions to transfer to local government.

 Review was also asked to consider as a cross-cutting issue the decision of the previous Administration to develop a council-led community planning process and a complementary power of Wellbeing.

- Interim decisions on the Review published by the Executive October 2007.
- Broad agreement on a Vision for a local government that would create sustainable, vibrant, healthy, prosperous and stable communities.
- Community Planning seen as a critical tool in delivering this.

- Focused period of stakeholder engagement carried out on the interim findings of the Review.
- Stakeholders across all sectors endorsed agreed Vision for local government.

o Process of engagement emphasised strong support for the introduction of Community Planning, in the context of the creation of a strong local government sector with responsibility for delivery of a "suite" of critical services that would make Community Planning meaningful.
